What is Canang Sari?

As you explore the island, you'll likely notice small, vibrant offerings placed on the ground or in front of homes. These are Canang Sari, a daily ritual of devotion practiced by Balinese Hindus.


Each Canang Sari is an expression of gratitude to Sang Hyang Widhi Wasa (the God) and a way to maintain balance and harmony between the spiritual and physical worlds.

What's Inside a Canang Sari?

Every Canang Sari is lovingly handcrafted using natural elements and symbolic colors:

- White flowers (East) Purity, for Iswara (Shiva)
- Red flowers (South) Courage, for Brahma
- Yellow flowers (West) Prosperity, for Mahadeva
- Blue/Green flowers (North) Harmony, for Vishnu

A stick of incense is often added, as the fragrant smoke rises, it is believed to carry the offering's essence to the divine.

Canang Sari is more than just an offering, it is a moment of presence, intention, and humility.

Each arrangement is a quiet prayer of gratitude, made with care and love, a reminder to honor the blessings of each day and live in balance with nature and spirit.
